
What is hybrid learning?


Tip # 2: Identify some proactive measures and tools for your specific scenario

- An asynchronous backup plan (pre-recorded video explanations)
- Arrange devices so that all the students can see and hear: cheap external camera to connect to zoom and special microphone (if possible)
- Find the best way to project and share your screen
- Clear, detailed, visual reminders of instructions (video)
- Use class time to focus on remote students.
- If f2f students have computers, online and f2f students can collaborate
- Scaffold activities to increase participation
